This is a first course in political theory. I will proceed on the assumption that students have had no prior exposure to the topics we will take up. Although most of the readings are from canonical texts we will work thematically. We will considerious basic political concepts especially power and freed and explore how different political thinkers have, over time, defended differing conceptions for a variety of different reasons and purposes. We will consider various ways terms, say, of onsent or procedural fairness or consequences justify or criticize political institutions and practices. And we will consider how differing theories of Ohuman nature, O and especially of human knowledge, inform competing conceptions of politics.

The course is, as the title suggests, introductory. It is aimed at first and second years students. Any student beyond the second year needs my explicit permission to enroll.

However, each assignment will presume familiarity with all the previously assigned readings. And in each instance you will have at least one week to complete the assignment.
