Identity, Ethnicity and Nationalism

Course Description

This course explores the concepts of identity, ethnicity and nationalism from a comparative perspective. Drawing upon theories from political science, anthropology, sociology and econorcs, we will examine how identity is defined and how societies use these constructions for, among other things, national reading, war, and party competition. Theoretical readings will be supplemented with empirical studies from developed and developing counters across different time periods.

Course Requirements
