Course Description

The course is divided into modules.

Module 1: This first part of this course covers identification of personal values, the role of individuals, community and government, healthcare law issues in the news, and definitions of health and law.

Module 2 addresses legal foundations, such as fundamental legal concepts and how they relate to healthcare. You will obtain the skills necessary to find, read, understand, and analyze primary legal documents (legislation and legal opinions). The content will include the structure of

government, the foundations of health law, and an introduction to legal thinking.

Module 3 covers key aspects of health care financing and legal reform efforts; topics may include an overview of the U.S. health care system, and the Affordable Care Act.

Module 4 will cover health equity and discrimination and other access barriers to health care, such as discrimination on the basis of religion, disability, and sex (including access to contraception and abortion).
